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
A Museum on display!

Exhibition of the cribs and on Aguchita

"Christmas in Latin America: from the village of Jesus and that of Aguchita"

The Museum and the Spiritual Centre chose for this new 2022 edition, which took place from 16th to 23rd December, to honour the cribs of the Latin American continent following the beatification of our Peruvian Sister, Aguchita.

Nearly 400 visitors discovered the 50 cribs very typical and representative of South American culture, as well as the life of Aguchita through an exhibition and a video.

One Object, One History

The bell of Marcq-en-Barœul



This 31-kg bell was baptized on 8th February 1920 by Mgr. Margerin, Vicar General of the Diocese of Lille.

Made in a foundry in Annecy together with another bell for the Chapel of the community in Lille, it bears three engravings: the Heart of Jesus the Blessed Virgin, and the Lamb.

On the day of the official blessing, the annals of the community of Our Lady of Charity in Marcq-en-Barœul (in the North of France) indicate that the two bells were "clad in silks gracefully draped with lace, decorated with ribbons like the children presented for baptism".

This and the following two extracts appear in the notes of Sr. Marie Jean Vianney Sol for the preparation of the catalogue of objects in the "salle du souvenir", archives of the Congregation in Angers, ref. 1 N 4 / 1.



One Object, One History

The bell of Marcq-en-Barœul

Its installation, at the end of the First World War was the consequence of the removal of the bells by the Germans in the area they occupied in Northern France. The annals have kept track of this. When, in October 1914, the Germans entered Lille, it was forbidden to ring the bells.

Three years later, in October 1917, a search for brass took place: “They also wanted to remove the drill bells, but one of them nearly fell from the

second floor, which removed their urge”, says the editor of the annals. The drill bell was finally removed in April 1918. The story continues: “One of the soldiers saw, as the bell was coming down, our bell tower and, suspecting that there were others hidden in it, went to climb it. His examination did not last long and soon we heard the sound of the destructive tools on the bronze of our largest bell which we had not heard since the day after the bombing of Lille.”

The Sisters were delighted when, in October 1919, Mgr Delassus, Dean of the Chapter of the Diocese of Lille, announced his wish to fill the belfries that had remained empty since the war. The installation of the bell on display on the first floor of the Museum filled a void that had existed for several years.

One of her favourite places in the Museum is the entrance hall, with its mythical "Green Door", through which Mary Euphrasia welcomed women in vulnerable situations and future young Sisters.
